3. Bring an item for the auction if you can.



BRANZ March 2021 *Guideline* newsletter

Here are a few snippets of news from BRANZ. For all the details, go to branz.co.nz and search for *Guideline*.

Recessed downlights

Older models of downlights needed gaps in the ceiling insulation to prevent the light from overheating, but this caused heat loss from the room. New models rated IC, IC-F or IC-4 can be covered with insulation following the manufacturer’s instructions.

However, some downlights still allow moisture laden air to move into the roof space, which can cause condensation or mould in the roof. Look for downlights which are specifically designed to reduce or prevent air movement from living spaces into the roof cavity.

Cowboys

Many construction practitioners need to be certified or registered to legally do certain work. Unfortunately, unregistered “cowboys” can imply they are legal. So how do you tell? Go to the BRANZ website to check links to registers to determine if your worker is the real deal.

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Cappamore Lodge renovations

The renovations at Cappamore Lodge are progressing well.

Jeff says, “We are waiting for Covid to really level off for Derek to be able to complete the decks.” Here are some pictures of how the new decks are shaping up.

He has decided on a new colour scheme for the trim and these colours will work well with the CD50 base. The exterior logs will be re-coated with CD50 Extreme, using the original colour of bronze.

There are areas he cannot reach via ladders, so the next task is to erect scaffolding.

But that’s not all. “A new roof in deep green is scheduled to go on too,” says Jeff. He adds, “A new kitchen, internal laundry and second bathroom in the garage which is being turned into my studio. Internal shutters on all windows and I am whitewashing my internal logs and wood ceilings. We are removing the tiled ceilings in the bedrooms to expose the ceiling to the rafters too.

“So much to do.”



Here is an overall view of the decks surrounding Cappamore. The extended deck acts as a carport and provides tons of elevated outdoor space off the upstairs french doors. The new stairway is not only beautiful, but is a safety feature as an emergency exit from the upper level.

ACCOMMODATION

We have two options for accommodation.

1. The Asure Avenue Motel, 117 Centennial Avenue, Alexandra. <https://www.avenue-motel.co.nz>. \$140 per night which includes a super king size bed and kitchen. Continental breakfast is available for an additional cost. These rooms must be booked before the end of April to ensure availability.

2. Our hosts are generously offering in-house accommodation at Homewood. They have a BnB cabin (one queen bed) <https://www.airbnb.co.nz/rooms/41566297?>, at least one room in the log house (queen bed) and the upper floor of their log garage (private, self contained, one queen and two singles in the same space and one pull out sofa bed). They do not want any payment for the rooms so don't hesitate to show your interest.

CONFERENCE SCHEDULE

Thursday 3 June 2021:

If you want to spend more time in Alexandra, book your accommodation to arrive on Thursday night. Then, Friday morning you can cycle the Otago Rail trail; rental bikes are available. At 4pm we will be visiting the Como Villa Museum and Vineyard for a tour, tasting and platter, www.comovilla.co.nz. Cost is \$20 for this activity, payable on registration.

Friday 4 June 2021:

Check in to Asure Avenue Motel or Homewood. If you arrive early enough, take in the Como Villa Tour, see above. Dinner on your own or with LBANZ associates!

Saturday 5 June 2021:

After breakfast together at Industry Lane, a local cafe in Alexandra, or on your own, we tour a few log homes in the Alexandra area. We will finish the tour at Homewood where we will have morning tea and hold our AGM including a catered lunch. (You can find the 2020 Teleconference Minutes in the Winter 2020 Issue 129 *No Problem!*) After the AGM walk to the Judge Rock Winery for a \$5 wine tasting, www.judgerock.co.nz and/or afternoon tea. Back to Homewood for drinks or some free time before climbing in a minibus to go for dinner.

Dinner will be at The Post Office in Clyde. <https://www.postofficecafeclde.co.nz/> We can choose our own meals from the extensive menu, suiting all tastes and budgets. After dinner we will hold our auction in a separate space reserved just for us. Don't forget your auction donations!

Sunday 6 June 2021:

After breakfast together at Industry Lane, we will travel to the Clyde Dam for an exclusive tour. If you are intending to head north at the end of the day, you will need to bring your own vehicle. The Dam Tour guide is offering this private tour for free but we will collect a small sum to provide him with a gift. There is a limit of only 15 people so register your intent ASAP. For those less excited about touring the dam, spend your time exploring Clyde with a Historical Walking Tour and/or an Art Gallery Tour. Lunch is your own preference with plenty of cafe and restaurant options in Clyde. After lunch we tour more log homes. Those going back to Alexandra can experience another wine tasting at Grey Ridge for a vineyard tour, wine tasting and platter, www.greyridge.co.nz. Cost is \$25 for this activity, payable on registration. A dinner booking has been made at Paulina's in Clyde – pizza and tapas bar.

Course 2021

Hi folks, well after last year's course being called off short due to Covid, we were all Covid free this year, and all from NZ funnily enough, well some not originally from NZ but are now locals.

This is the first year I've had two different students that already had log homes that I had not built. Wierd, but cool.

One of the great stories of this year was a father and son team from Hawkes Bay with a few cabin ideas. Neil had planted his trees for his cabin some 25-30 years ago, and he's been following us tentatively for that many years just waiting to go on this Log Building Course. Amazing, he remembers when I started log building.

This year students started the Log Alpaca home for Hilton view, and met the alpacas.

We got 30 logs laid over a couple of different structures, as well as numerous practice logs chopped into fire wood.

The group was very well matched and got on immensely. I hate to think how we would have been if like the early days we all camped on site and were with each other 24/7.

I often talked about the North Island as if I didn't know where it was, which amused those from here, and those not from there.

Some home brew made it down from the North Island, something called Omana Crude, very, very tasty, and some very special gin from the UK.

See in the pictures the strangest notch scribe I've ever seen, but I straightened that out. It still amazes me and the students that they were still learning things right up to the last day.

Again working in the professional yard makes a huge difference when wanting to demonstrate something, or view something different than they have seen. Three other log home structures were under construction during this time. Also the students got to meet and chat with real log builders. They also got to use all of the professional tools and there is absolutely no substitute for that remote controlled crane.

The Day Tour is always a blast and has to be just at the correct time for the students to know and understand what they are looking at. The inspiration is huge with style, colours, shapes, roofs,



